## JUDGES' COMMENTS

## Standard Fine Art Division Andrew Connors

Andrew Connors is Curator of Art at the Albuquerque Museum and has served as Chair of the Visual Arts Department at Albuquerque Academy, Senior Curator at the National Hispanic Cultural Center in Albuquerque, and Associate Curator at the Smithsonian American Art Museum. He studied Art History and Architecture at Yale University and pursued his PhD in Folklore and American Studies at George Washington University.

During judging, Andrew was drawn to multiple traditional selections. He looked for works that had an appeal from a distance, but also had close-up details of character through the use of complementary and meticulous brush strokes with some loose painting architecture, strong color balance, motion through shading and value, and overall compositional flow. He enjoyed works where the artist balanced layers with an added sense of creativity in their brush details, while projecting energy through angular light and shadow placement in appealing proportions. Some of his favorite pieces were those that were not a straight-forward depiction of the expected, rather, works that allowed the viewer to participate in a piece of the world from a different vantage point that wouldn't otherwise be considered beautiful. He gravitated to contrasting tonal ranges and images with strong value manipulation through unexpected colors. Works where the artist employed a diagonal pivot point, Andrew felt this technique added interest and energy to the composition. He mentioned the placement of arbitrary brush marks in works inspired from Mother Nature was a way for the artist to portray the piece as art, instead of paintings resembling "a painted photograph".

On matting and framing, Andrew advised against the use of contrasting double matting and overwhelming frames. He recommended using simple matting and frame choices. Andrew encourages artists to have confidence in their painting and composition.

# Miniature/Small Works Fine Art Division Carol Carpenter

We certainly welcome Carol Carpenter as our Judge for Miniatures in 2019. She has been captivated by the miniature scale for some time now and has won many awards in her artistic journey.

Carol was highly impressed with the quality of the works this year, finding it most difficult to choose one excellent work over another. She was always looking at composition and balance, citing colors as an example. "If you can't tell what color it is, it's a good color" is one of her beliefs. She looked for use of edges, both hard and soft, which should be included in everything one paints.

Some of the paintings reflected a smoothness that lent itself to a mood or intimacy which added to the artist's own expression of subject matter. Carol wanted to see a story, one that begged a repeat visit.

Of course scale was important, that sense of miniature that held its own under magnification. And she commented often on framing issues, both good and bad. Frames must always enhance a work, not distract.
